RIVERSIDE ANGLICAN CHURCHES QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION AND REFLECTION 1 Peter 4:1-6 – Living to please God

Read 1 Peter 4:1-6

- 1. Why did Jesus suffer in the flesh? When did it happen? What was it for? (cf 1:11, 2:21-24, 3:18)
- 2. Read verses 1-3 and 6 and discuss what Peter means by "the flesh".
- 3. In verse 1, what does Peter mean by "whoever has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin"? Do people with cancer never sin? Do persecuted Christians overseas never sin?
- 4. Suppose we live in a country where there is very little (and mostly minor) persecution for being a Christian: How can we know if we are obeying Peter's instruction to "arm yourselves with the same way of thinking"?
- 5. In verse 2, what are human passions? Is God a kill-joy? (see also 1:14, 1:18 and 2:11).
- 6. What do the items in verse 3 have in common? What is it that makes them sin?
- 7. Is it still "joining in" when we're just watching it on television or in a movie, or on the internet, or in a magazine? (Note: In Matthew 11:19 Jesus was accused of being a glutton because he spent time with gluttons and Romans 1:32 tells us approval is as bad as committing sin. How do we know where the line is?)
- 8. How do your own patterns of life stand up against this instruction from Peter? Are there things you shouldn't be joining in with? Why is it hard?
- 9. What is the risk to us if we don't join in with the kind of sin described in verse 3? How do you prepare for this? (Hint: read verses 1 and 2 again) When was the last time your godly behaviour shocked someone?
- 10. What is the perspective that verse 5 adds? Is it intended as a warning or an encouragement?
- 11. According to verse 6, why was the gospel preached? How central is pleasing God in your own life and behaviours?
