QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION OR REFLECTION

Bible passage: Revelation 19:11-20:15

Do you think understanding the “end times” is important? Why or why not?

This study will take us through the events in historical order rather than literary order.

Read Revelation 20:1-6

1. Read Heb. 2:14 and Rev. 12:10-12. When was Satan bound and what events brought this about?
2. Look at vv. 3 and 6. In what way is Satan bound? Are there ways that he is not bound?
3. Who is it that gets to reign with Christ throughout this period? Are we reigning with him now?
4. Read Rev. 14:1-5. What kind of sacrifice do we offer God and the lamb as his priests in heaven?

Read Revelation 19:11-21

5. When does this battle occur?
6. What strikes you about the way that Jesus is described? What strikes you about the way this battle is conducted?
7. Who survives by the end of this battle?

Read Revelation 20:7-10

8. What are the similarities in how the battle is described in chaps. 19 and 20? In what ways are they described differently?
9. Why do you think Revelation 19-20 provides two different perspectives on these same events?

Read Revelation 20:11-15

10. Who is it that will stand before the judgment seat of God on the last day?
11. What is the basis upon which every person will be judged? Does this include Christians?
12. What is the basis of our salvation on this day?
13. How does this understanding of the end change how we should live now?

Bible passage: Revelation 19:11-20:15

Eschatology — our understanding of the end of time — can seem like an eccentric topic

How we understand the end is important — it determines how we live in the present

- 1. Jesus' war with the Beast and his False Prophet (19:11-21)**

- 2. The same war but with a cosmic perspective: God vs. Satan (20:7-10)**

- 3. The Day of Judgment: God assesses how we have lived (20:11-15)**

- 4. The Millennium – God's People Reign with Christ when they die (20:1-6)**

Three Practical Implications:

1. Remain Faithful to the End

2. Care about Holiness

3. Do not fear Death
